Sunday Reflection

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY AND JOSEPH
YEAR A 2025
(Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14; Ps 127; Col 3:12-21; Mt. 2:13-15, 19-23)

THEME: LIVING AS CHRISTIAN FAMILIES

Christmas has always been a family feast, whether in Cameroon, England, or anywhere on this planet. It is a time when families try to come together and celebrate not only the joy of Christmas but also the joy of family life. This explains why those living away from their homeland and families always endeavour to return home during Christmas. The Church, aware of the family dimension of Christmas, offers us today the chance to celebrate family life. She encourages us to do this by emulating the example of the Holy Family—Jesus, Mary, and Joseph—of Nazareth. The family, as Christ restored it to its original form, is something holy, enduring, and monogamous. In this regard, He elevated the contract from which it originates to the dignity of a sacrament, thereby placing the family itself on the plane of the supernatural. Therefore, today presents us with the opportunity to strengthen what we may not always celebrate fully in our individual Christian families.

The family is the smallest yet most basic and vital society. The Christian family is supernatural because it originates from a sacrament. The ideals of a Christian family have always been shown to surpass those of a non-Christian family. The Christian family, as a small community, demonstrates itself as a great human community within the divine plan and reflects the Church, which is a larger family. Sadly, this ideal Christian family faces many challenges. In this light, the Holy Father, Pope Francis, said: "There is no perfect family. We do not have perfect parents, we are not perfect, we do not marry a perfect person or have perfect children. We have complaints from each other. We disappoint each other." In the face of these imperfect families, we need the example of the Holy Family of Nazareth to serve as a light in the darkness of our families.

From the above, we realise that we all have a duty to work towards making our families better places for ourselves, our spouses, children, relatives, and friends. The readings of today encourage us in that regard. That is why the first reading highlights the responsibilities of all family members. We must recognise that the wife is neither a slave nor the property of her husband, but his partner. The children are not objects to be bought, sold, or disposed of at will through free choice. Children and all members of a family have their own unique roles to play in making the family a harmonious and peaceful environment. When everyone fulfils their role well, the family is like a choir in which each member sings their

part, creating beautiful musical harmony.

To foster harmony within a family and ensure it functions well, today's readings offer us valuable guidance. The first reading urges children to show respect, obedience, and honour towards their parents. It also encourages them to support their parents in their old age; and I would add, always. These are core values that both spouses and children need. The second reading highlights the importance of love, compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience as essential virtues to cultivate in every family. It further emphasises the significance of forgiveness. Stressing the importance of forgiveness, I will include what the Holy Father Francis stated: "So there is no healthy marriage or healthy family without the exercise of forgiveness. Forgiveness is vital to our emotional health and spiritual survival. Without forgiveness the family becomes an arena of conflict and a stronghold of hurt. Without forgiveness, the family becomes ill. Forgiveness is the asepsis of the soul, the cleansing of the mind and the liberation of the heart. Whoever does not forgive does not have peace in the soul nor communion with God. Hurt is poison that intoxicates and kills. Keeping heartache in the heart is a self-destructive gesture. It's autophagy. Those who do not forgive are physically, emotionally, and spiritually ill. That is why the family must be a place of life, not of death; Territory of cure and not of illness; Stage of forgiveness and not guilt. Forgiveness brings joy where sorrow has produced sadness; Healing, where sorrow has caused disease".

But these virtues are not acquired from watching TV, playing games, or reading books. They require hard work and perseverance. That is why St. Paul urges us to teach and advise one another in all wisdom, doing so with gratitude in our hearts. Through this, our spouse and children shall come to know God, listen to his words, and follow his example.

Even when we work on these issues, I must urge you to be cautious. Building a Christian family faces many obstacles. Some identified dangers include: individualism, unfaithfulness, divorce, workaholism, selfishness, lack of concern, laziness or sloth, lying and blackmail, immorality or immodesty, sexual deviations, and a lack of respect for life. Therefore, we must pray for the spiritual renewal of our families, both human and Christian, across all nations, especially in our world today, which is becoming more advanced and increasingly marked by the signs and benefits of progress.
